Editorial

This week I've been preparing a sermon about Thomas the Disciple. It's the first in our new series "Ordinary People, Extraordinary God", which will run until after King's Birthday weekend. We may think of many of the people in the Bible as 'giants of the faith'. Among them were great leaders and thinkers, gifted poets and miracle workers. There are many sermons and books about how we can be more like some of these people in the Bible. Yet when we take



an honest look at each of them, we find the varnish is pretty thin.

In a world often driven by competition for resources and experiences, we are constantly told we should be extraordinary, or different. A simple **Google search for books with the words "extraordinary life" in the title** returns a plethora of titles. Either documenting the lives of people we consider to be extraordinary or providing steps on how we can live an **extraordinary life. A Google search for books about "ordinary life" returns** many fewer titles, often with a subtext of how to make an ordinary life extraordinary.

When it comes down to it, we can depend on being extraordinary for part, even just a small part, of our identity. The Dutch Catholic theologian, Henri Nouwen, writes that "the temptation ... to let yourself be drowned in the praise ... of the world always remains". Only when we remember in our deepest being our true identity as a dearly loved child of God can we find rest from this drive to be extraordinary.

The story of the Bible is not about extraordinary people doing extraordinary things for God. Rather it is about an extraordinary God embracing people in their ordinariness, working with them as they are, and transforming them into the image of God's son, Jesus. That's a story open to all of us. A story that leads us to peace and rest in God's unquenchable divine love. We hope you can join us for this series either in person or online as we explore and discover together the ways our extraordinary God embraces ordinary people.

Our first item on our agenda was to organise topics for our forthcoming month's Bucket Mission collections. They are:

- Gifts of Love - a Christian World Service initiative .

This has been delayed a week because of Easter. It will now be held on the 2nd Sunday in April 14/4.

- Mattresses for Ōhope - We have been asked to help with the funding of mattresses for our "home" marae at Ōhope. This marae situated on Ōhope beach front hosts a lot of church gatherings including a recent assembly. This is the place where Rory spent his study leave. This collection will be held on Sunday 5th May.

40 hour Famine - This collection will be held on Sunday 2nd. June.

The last 6 weeks has been most successful for our two Harvest Tables where we raised \$521.70. This money has gone to Family Works to help **pay for their recent very successful initiative called "Children on the Bay". It** was encouraging to read a letter to the editor in a recent Timaru Herald (19/3) expressing the grateful thanks of a local family whose children really enjoyed the opportunity of free rides and fun activities that Family Works provided.

At present our Harvest tables are raising funds for 24/7 programme being

held at Mountain View College and Ocean View primary school. 24/7 has a team of 3 dedicated youth workers that help students struggling with identity issues, mental health, poverty and tough home environments.

The collection of funds for the Harvest Table changes every 6 weeks, and the next change at the beginning of June will be raising funds for Family Works food bank's meat supplies.

Our autumn pizza lunch will take place on Sunday April 21st following a combined service at St.Stephen's. Keep this date free! Come along and enjoy a pizza lunch with your church friends. Cost - a donation.

Alpine Presbytery gathering held at St Margaret's Bishopdale new facilities

St Margaret's hosted the first gathering of our Presbytery for the year in their recently opened new facilities in Farrington Ave, ChCh on Thursday 25 - Saturday 27 April. Their original building was destroyed by arson around 7 years ago and it has been a very long journey to rebuild. The design is simple and fresh and they have achieved a rare thing; a multipurpose space that has the right ambience for worship but is flexible for other users.

The gathering was an opportunity to approve the financial report from the previous year, set the budget for the current year, hear progress reports from the various initiatives of the presbytery and to be inspired and encouraged in our life together. There were many encouraging stories told of lives being impacted in various ways through new initiatives such as a new work arising out of the old lona church in **Aranui which uses Māori culture such as wood carving and taiaha (a** form of martial art) to connect the gospel to locals in this community; **the work of local chaplains from St Andrews College, Christchurch men's** prison and Burwood hospital; and some interesting work happening from Te Whare Awhero (Hope house) in Hei Hei as they seek to provide long term help to households in need.

Another highlight was the commissioning of Rev Dan Spragg to the role of Kaihautu Whakatipu (Ministries Coordinator) which is a new role



established to boost the work of presbytery especially in the new mission seedling space. It is vital to the ongoing life of our church that new initiatives are supported and resourced and Dan brings a wealth of expertise to this area.



ANZAC SLICE

- •100 g butter
- •2 tablespoon golden syrup *
- •1/2 cup (110g) sugar
- •1/4 cup (50g) brown sugar
- ●1 cup (110g) rolled oats
- •1 cup (100g) dessicated coconut
- •1 cup (140g) flour
- •¾ teaspoon baking soda
- •2 tablespoon warm water
- •1/2 cup dried cranberries
- 1/2 cup dried apricots roughly chopped
- •1/2 cup walnuts roughly chopped
- •1/2 cup chocolate chips
- •2 tablespoon coconut oil

*If you can't find golden syrup you can use honey or light corn syrup in it's place.

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C and line a 20cm x 20cm brownie tin with baking paper.
- 2. Melt butter and golden syrup in a medium saucepan over a medium heat.
- 3. Remove from the heat and add sugars, oats, coconut, flour and mix together.
- 4. In a small bowl or measuring cup, dissolve the baking soda in the water and add to the slice mixture.
- 5. Add the cranberries, apricots & walnuts and mix well to combine.
- 6. Tip the mixture into the prepared tin and press down.
- 7. Bake for 25 minutes until top is golden brown. Remove from the oven and allow to cool in the tin.
- 8. Melt the chocolate chips and coconut oil together and drizzle over the cooled slice.
- 9. Cut into 16 pieces and store in an airtight container at room temperature for about 10 days.


